

### THERE AND BACK AGAIN

Now on that same day when Jesus had appeared to Mary Magdalene, two disciples were going to a village called Emmaus, about seven miles from Jerusalem, and talking with each other about all these things that had happened. While they were talking and discussing, Jesus himself came near and went with them, but their eyes were kept from recognizing him. Luke 24:13-16

The story of the disciples on the way from Jerusalem the evening of Easter has always been a powerful one to me. They left Jerusalem convinced that their Lord had died and that the story was over . . . they walked into the evening and the gathering darkness consumed with conversation on the events that had happened. So consumed, in fact, that they could not see that the stranger that came alongside them in their journey was Christ himself!

I have been on a long journey. For the first time in my almost 28 years of ordained ministry, I went on a sabbatical. I will be forever grateful for the encouragement and support of this congregation, the staff, and Pr Friederike in particular for her additional responsibilities that made this profoundly generous time possible. This journey brought me alongside many strangers through the months and countries. Many of these people were with me for just a moment, and others for more meaningful periods of time. However, all of them were Christ to me . . . although I suspect I did not always see or appreciate it. Isn't the journey of this life like this? We move through our days and years often very distracted by the worries that keep us up and keep us from recognizing Christ in those who come along side of us.

As we approach Lent, we experience an opportunity. An opportunity to remove something from our regular routines . . . or as I like to think, perhaps to add something. Taking intentional time to slow down, to treasure the world around us and to see Christ alongside us in our journey. Lent has often been seen as dour or depressing. It's seen as a season to give up something treasured. However, there is a description of Lent that has resonated with me powerfully over the years. That Lent is a time of austerity, but not an austerity that connotes a lack of joy. There is a sense of spring cleaning, or of training for a race, or of returning to a simple less hectic pace, or perhaps to add a spiritual or relational exercise for these 40 days.


When Easter dawns on us, we can then celebrate for the week of weeks that our tradition calls for, knowing that we are ready to do so! The flowers bursting forth, and leaves shading our way remind us of the irrepressible force for life that the resurrection brings. May this Lenten season be a deliberate deep time for you, and may your emerge on the other end of these 40 days ready to experience the joy of new life where we did not expect it. It is a real joy to be back from sabbatical to walk with you into these holy days. ❖



The phenomenon of group singing is a topic I've been interested in for many years. Who sings? Why do people do it? What meaning do people find in making music with others, and how does it make them feel?

Singing is deeply human. Nearly everyone has a voice, a built-in instrument with the capacity to make sound. We use our voices for communication, to express the whole range of emotions— pleasure, sadness, anger, pain, and joy— and to create beauty. An individual can do this alone, but something even more magical happens when our voices blend to create music together. The joining together of breath, sound, and common purpose builds community and creates a door for the Holy Spirit to enter.

In many societies around the world, singing is a deeply ingrained and everyday part of the culture. In places like ours with less connection to folk traditions, vocal music-making has been more and more relegated to professionals. But singing is certainly still something everyone CAN do, and we do still see glimmers of it in our culture: We sing "Happy Birthday" regularly, a few brave souls sing at sporting events, and we do a lot of singing at church!

Martin Luther lived at a time when people sang every day at work, at the tavern, and at home, but church singing had largely devolved to choirs and the clergy.

Luther himself loved to sing, and he observed how important it was: singing words aids memory, and he realized that he could teach the Bible along with his new theological concepts through song. He also understood how the participation of the whole congregation could help people connect more fully with the experience of worship. Luther encouraged the writing of new songs for church, and the first collections of these hymns were published exactly 500 years ago this year, in 1524! Some of the melodies sound a little strange to us today, but in 1524 their style would have been very comfortable and easy to learn for people living in that time and place.

The community of Taizé, in France, has also devoted significant attention to creating music that everyone, not just professionals, can sing. Founded as a modern monastic community in the 1940s, Taizé began attracting visitors from all over Europe and beyond in the 1960s, and today on

almost any day of the year, hundreds or even thousands of people are visiting there on retreat. To welcome these guests and help them enter more fully into worship, the community has created a distinctive style of short, repeated song that focuses the attention of the gathered community and deepens prayer. We practice this type of prayer and song at Grace on the second Sunday of each month at 7 pm.

Our "Not Choir" gathering on Thursdays at 7 pm has changed a bit in focus over the few years we've been meeting. Designed originally as a class where we could work on improving vocal skills, it's morphed more into a social time where we sing for the pure joy of it. We still do a little bit of experimenting with vocal technique and with music reading. But a lot more of what we do is exploring music: discovering the richness and variety of vocal music as practiced around the world and at all times in history. We sing a lot from our hymnal, and sometimes from other sources. And those who attend regularly have learned

how much I love YouTube! I'm constantly on the hunt for examples of singing, hymns especially, in every style and cultural tradition imaginable. This singing happens in churches of course, but sometimes in other surprising contexts! The Advent devotional you all received in December, with something to watch or listen to each day, was a little taste of the kinds of videos we watch in Not Choir every week. The hour or so I spend combing YouTube on Thursday afternoons in preparation for that evening's Not Choir is one of the most fun hours of my week, maybe second to actually sharing the material later the same evening! Along with the videos, we usually "preview" the hymns that will be sung in church on the upcoming Sunday a great way to prepare for worship! Anyone is welcome to visit Not Choir at any time... there's no real sequence to it and you don't need to have started from the beginning. Welcome!

I look forward to every opportunity when we can sing together. See you soon! ❖



This year I choose to live in God's great abundance and I hope you will too! ❖







#### COMMUNION CLASS | March 23, 10am



## SOUTH PALO ALTO FOOD CLOSE

During Lent each year, we highlight our ministry partners working to alleviate hunger in our community and throughout our nation. In addition to the monthly gathering of food and diapers for the Ecumenical Hunger Program, each week during Lent we will also gather food for the South Palo Alto Food Closet. Grace was a founding member of the Food Closet in the 1970's. It is located nearby at Covenant Presbyterian Church on East Meadow Drive.





Each year the Endowment Committee invites Grace members to submit grant applications to the Legacy Fund, which is a permanent resource to support the mission and life of Grace Lutheran Church.

- Internal Grace-related grant requests address oneoff needs that are not included in the normal church
  operating budget, which may include one-time or
  unforeseen circumstances. Suggested grant amounts are
  \$500-\$2,000, up to 25% of the total grant amount for the
  year
- External qualified non-profit grant requests should be supported by strong knowledge and sponsorship of the organization by the Grace recommending member.
   Priority is given to organizations and programs that support the local community, or for national or international organizations that have strong ELCA ties.

Suggested grant amounts are \$500-\$2,000up to 25% of the total grant amount for the year.

At our January meeting, Council covered a variety of topics. We heard an update from Treasurer, Eric

Brudos about how the 2023 calendar year ended and what the finance team anticipates for the rest of the 2024-2025 fiscal year. Barbara Erickson reported about the **Legacy Fund** status and noted that the application period for grants to the Legacy Fund has been extended to Feb. 9. The Endowment Committee will present grant recommendations to Council in March.

Council also formed a team to consider Elizabeth Hood's desire to be called by Grace as an ordained deacon. This team will explore Grace's need for a deacon on staff in this capacity, consider budgetary implications, reflect on other issues as appropriate, and then make a recommendation to Council. Deacons are rostered Ministers of Word and Service with the same call process/guidelines as Pastors who are Ministers of Word and Sacrament. Ordained Deacons are a new ministry in the ELCA since 2017. The team is comprised of a cross-section of church committee representatives and includes Maria Derrick from CYFT (Children, Youth, & Family Team), Julie Buckley from Mutual Ministry, Yvonne Baur from Finance & Council, as well as myself as Council President, and Pr. Matt.

In February and March, we move into a time of reflection during Lent and the resurrection of Easter. Council will hold our first retreat since the pandemic in February. We will use this time together for reflection and planning, paying careful attention to the needs and mission of Grace. Some of that planning will be focused on stewardship and budget planning for the 2024–2025 fiscal year. We will also take up preliminary planning for our next capital campaign cycle. To continue the care and stewardship of our physical spaces, our capital campaigns typically cover a three-year span. The **Generations of Grace** capital campaign was delayed one year due to the pandemic and concludes this fall. (I know we've all been enjoying how the roof over Brown Hall and the preschool no longer leak, as well as all the improvements to the Education wing—renovated restrooms, new windows, carpet, asbestos abatement, and new paint!) Council will review a proposal for our next capital campaign. Stay tuned for updates as we identify a new set of repairs and improvements to enhance our campus.

Finally, Council enjoyed seeing the congregation at the annual **Celebrate Grace** event on January 27—such a fun event to gather and celebrate one another!
